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## A. AND M. COACHING STAFF

COACH RAY GEORGE is starting his second year as head football coach for Texas A.&M. George came to A.&M. from the University of Southern California in January of 1951.

George played football for USC and was an All Pacific Coast Conference tackle in 1938-39, the year that Southern California defeated Notre Dame, the national champions, 13-0 and Duke in the Rose Bowl, 7-3. George was also named outstanding athlete at USC in 1939.

He played pro football one year each with the Detroit Lions and the Philadelphia Eagles. He returned to California and took a high school coaching job. In 1941 he had an undefeated team at Porterville (Calif.) high school.

He entered the Navy as an ensign in 1942 and served aboard the carrier Midway during the Saipan-Guam campaign.

He returned to the states and played football with Iowa pre-flight in 1944. He then completed his tour of duty aboard the USS Princeton, being released in 1945 as a lieutenant commander.

George played pro football one year with the Los Angeles Bulldogs and then joined the USC coaching staff as a line coach. During the five years that he coached the line, Southern California won the Pacific Coast title once and finished no lower than third on three other occasions.

George came to A.&M. as line coach in January 1951, and was elevated to the head coaches position in April of that year.

Mrs. George is a graduate of Southern California also. They have two boys, John 8, and Gregory, 3.

PAUL McMURTRY will coach the defensive line for the Texas Aggies this fall.

He lettered at guard at the University of Southern California for three consecutive years. During this time he played under the tutelage of Coach Ray George. McMurtry graduated from USC in February, 1950 after a big season, with the highlight being his blocking a punt which gave the Trojans a 9-6 victory over Notre Dame.

McMurtry made All Pacific Coast his senior year and was also team captain.

McMurtry went from Rio Hondo (Texas) high school directly into the Navy and was in service for eight years. He then enrolled in Long Beach (Calif.) Junior College and entered the University of Southern California the next season. He is married and has one boy, Jimmy, 8.

GILBERT STEINKE has the job of rebuilding the Texas Aggie backfield. Steinke moved up from assistant to backfield coach at the beginning of the 1951 season.

Steinke is a former little All American halfback at Texas A, and I. After graduation from college in 1942, he played pro football with the Philadelphia Eagles, leading the National League in punt returns in 1946.

After serving as backfield coach at Trinity University, he went to Oklahoma A.&M. as freshman football mentor. He came to Texas A.&M. in 1950.

Steinke is married and has six-year-old twin sons, Larry and Leslie, and a daughter nearly three years old. He was born in Ganado, Texas. DALTON FAIRCLOTH, assistant coach, is entering his third year as a member of the Aggie football coaching staff.

Faircloth comes from Louisiana where he had brilliant high school coaching record, culminating in his being named "Coach of the Year" in Louisiana in 1949.

Faircloth attended Louisiana College where he earned 12 letters in football, basketball, baseball and track. He was all conference in both football and basketball in 1931.

Faircloth has coached at Louisiana College (freshman), New Albany, Mississippi, High School, and De Quincey (La.) High School. Faircloth served in the U. S. Air Force for 52 months as a commissioned officer.

BILL DAYTON was named trainer at Texas A.&M. on August 1, 1949 and since that time he has compiled a remarkable record of keeping Aggie athletes "ready to play."

Dayton served two years as trainer at Tulane before coming to Texas A.&M. Earlier he was trainer at the University of Miami from 1938 through 1942 and again in 1945, 1946, and part of 1947.

He served in the Navy and was at Georgia Pre-Flight in Athens, Ga. for three years.

Born in New York City in 1914, he was graduated from the Swedish Institute of Physio-therapy in 1937 and in 1938 he graduated from the Eastern School of Physio-therapy. He is married and has a 10-year-old daughter.

WILLIAM M. "BILL" DUNCAN is starting his first years as end coach for the Texas Aggies. Duncan came to Texas A.&M. from French High School in Beaumont where he was head football coach and athletic director.

Duncan played end on the Aggies' 1938 football team and the National Champion team of 1939.

Duncan played one year of professional football with the Long Island Indians before entering the Army in February 1941.

After leaving the service, Duncan spent one season as assistant coach at Wichita Falls. He, then became athletic director and head football coach at Belton.

He went to Beaumont in August, 1948.

COOPER ROBBINS, SR., came to A.&M. from Breckenridge. During his 24 years of high school coaching Robbins' teams have won the state championship once and on one other occasion they won the regional championship. His teams have won bi-district championships five times and district championships four times. He has never coached a team that finished below third place in the district race.

Robbins graduated from A.&M. in 1928 and took his first coaching job at Humble High. He went to Northside of Fort Worth in 1930 and in 1933 went to Diamond Hill, Fort Worth. In 1939 he coached Technical High, Fort Worth and returned to Northside in 1942.

He went to Breckenridge in 1945. He came to A.&M. as freshman coach in June of this year.

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## HONOR OLYMPIC STARS

Today A&M will honor its athletes who have represented the United States at three Olympic Games.

Spanning more than thirty years of time, these athletes are guests of the college at today's game and will be presented with special certificates signifying their service at halftime.

Those to be honored are Jack Mahan who placed sixth in the javelin throw in 1920 at Antwerp Belgium, Art Harnden who ran on the gold medal winning 1600 meter relay team in 1948 at London, England, Walter, "Buddy" Davis, who took a gold medal in the high jump at Helsinki, Finland in 1952, and Darrow Hooper who placed second in the shot put at Helsinki, Finland in 1952.

Any gathering of A&M track stars would be incomplete without paying tribute to the man

who has meant so much to track at A&M, Col. Frank Anderson, Aggie track coach.

"Col. Andy" as he is called by his boys, coached Harnden, Davis and Hooper. He was assistant track coach at A&M in Mahan's senior year and worked with him some. (This was the year after the Olympic Games in Antwerp, Belgium).

Year in and year out he has produced outstanding track teams. Most of these teams have contained many boys that came from the rank and file of the student body. An examination of his track squads over the years shows a surprisingly small number of outstanding high school track stars in comparison to the number of boys that he has developed into top flight competitors.

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## **TODAY'S GAME**

Can the Aggies break the Rice victory hold this afternoon? In recent years Rice football teams seem to have the Indian sign on the Cadets. The Aggies have not won from Rice since 1944. This is the longest current string of victories that any team holds over A&M.

The Owls won a victory over the Arkansas Razorbacks last Saturday in Fayetteville, Arkansas, while the Aggies were losing to the SMU Mustangs by a 21 to 13 count.

In addition to losing the SMU ball game the Aggies may have lost the services of their star quarterback Ray Graves—at least for the Rice game. At press time the probability of Graves' being able to play was still very much in doubt. This will leave Roy Dollar and Don Ellis to handle the quarterbacking chores. Ellis has been running from a halfback post while Dollar has been handling punting chores and has played some at quarterback in conference competition. Coach Jess Neeley has the strong right arm of quarterback Dan Drake to power the Owl passing attack. The Owls are strong on the ground with such backs as Bill Frazier, Carl Johnson and David Johnson to lug the pigskin. The Owls have showed up well even in defeat.

Pass defense has been the big problem facing Coach Jess Neeley. Today's game may show that Rice has solved this defensive weakness of past games.

The Owls always play one of their best games of the season against A&M. The experts are picking Rice as they cannot understand how the "patched up" Aggie backfield score can score enough points to stay even with the high powered Rice scoring machine.

For the Aggies, sophomore and junior players have been coming through in grand style when the chips were down. Today's game may be another case when Coach George's inexperienced team will pull a victory out of the fire.
