GUESTS OF THE MUSTANGS tonight are the Rice Institute Owls, the team that is favored to win the Southwest Conference championship. Coach Jess Neely of Rice has a veteran aggregation as nine of the starters are seniors and some of them are playing their third year as regulars.

The experienced Owls opened their season with an impressive triumph over Florida, the team that held Georgia Tech to a scoreless tie the following week. Then came a long trip and an easy victory over Cornell in New York State. Last Saturday Rice used every man on the squad as it triumphed over Hardin-Simmons 40 to 0.

Rice's line is rated among the tops in the nation both offensively and defensively. Tall, powerful, and fast, the Owl forwards have dealt misery to runners, passers and punters of three teams already this season and at the same time they have cleared the paths for their backs to operate effectively. Leroy Fenstemaker, Carl and Kosse Johnson, and Dicky Moegle are among the better backs in the conference.

SMU's new-modeled machine also has been playing a fast brand of ball. Although they lost to Georgia Tech by two points, the Mustangs decisively defeated the Missouri Tigers 20 to 7 last week.

Rice and SMU have played 32 games with the Mustangs winning 17 and losing 15. For the last four years the visiting team has been victorious but the Ponies hope to break this precedent tonight.

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Next Home Game

H OMECOMING with the University of Texas as the opposition assures the largest crowd of the season when the Mustangs play their next game in the Cotton Bowl at 2 p.m., Saturday, October 31.

Texas was a charter member of the Southwest Conference and SMU joined three years later. Since that time the two schools have met on the gridiron 31 times with each school winning 14 games and with three games resulting in ties. As the Longhorns also have a victory over the Ponies prior to the time SMU joined the conference, SMU this year will be attempting to even the all-time standing.

Coach Ed Price of the Longhorns saw his team lose intersectional games to the LSU Tigers and to the Oklahoma Sooners as he gave his sophomores game experience to prepare them for the Southwest Conference race. The Longhorns have a wealth of young players and the team should improve steadily as the season progresses.

The seniors on the SMU team will be getting their last chance to participate in a victory over the Longhorns as the Steers triumphed 20 to 13 in 1951 and 31 to 14 last year. Numbered among these seniors are Bill Fox and Don Cole, centers; Jerry Clem and Darrell Lafitte, guards; Jack Gunlock and Lou Miller, tackles; Alex Litowkin, end, and Sam Stollenwerck, Jerry Norton, Don Miller, Dale Moore, and Bill Crisler, backs.

The SMU Alumni Association has planned a weekend of activities that is expected to break all records for attendance.



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Jerry Clem, 205, 6-1, 21, Senior, Texarkana. Used as a linebacker last year, Co-captain Jerry missed few plays when the Mustangs were on the defensive, being credited with 284 minutes. Shifted to guard in the spring training sessions, he quickly demonstrated his ability to handle the blocking assignments. Don Cole, 187, 6-0, 21, Senior, Gladewater. A defensive sub for All-American Dick Hightower two years ago, Don played enough to letter and then played 179 minutes as a junior. In spring workouts he quickly adapted himself to the duties of an offensive center in the "T" formation.

Athletic Director

The spring of 1953 saw the realization of many of the ambitions of Matty Bell, SMU's athletic director. When he resigned as head football coach in 1950 to devote full time to his duties as director of athletics, he announced that he hoped to increase the interest taken in sports other than football. That his efforts to improve these teams have been successful was shown by the records they made during the 1952-53 school year. The basketball team won the Southwest Conference tournament, and the swimming and golf teams became champions of the Southwest Conference. The baseball team tied for the Conference title with a record of 12 victories and three defeats. SMU's mile relay quartet took first in the Conference meet, and the track team finished third. The tennis team won 11 dual meets and lost two.

Mr. Bell has been an outstanding figure in the sports world for more than a third of a century. He gained wide recognition as a football player at North Side High School in Fort Worth and at Centre College before he accepted a position as head football coach at Haskell Institute. After two years at the Institute, he moved to Carroll College as head coach, and a year later—in 1923—he became football coach at Texas Christian University, which had just been admitted to the Southwest Conference.

Six successful years at TCU were followed by five years as head coach at Texas A&M. Then in 1934 he became line coach at SMU, and when Ray Morrison moved to Vanderbilt in 1935, Mr. Bell succeeded him as head coach at SMU, a position he held until January, 1950. He was on leave of absence for three years when he served as a commander in the USNR. Upon his return from the Navy in 1945, Mr. Bell was named director of athletics at SMU, assuming that responsibility in addition to his football duties.

During his years as a football coach, Mr. Bell's teams won 155 games, lost 86, and tied 17. His SMU teams played in the Rose Bowl once and the Cotton Bowl twice. His Mustangs won Conference champion-ships in 1935, 1947, and 1948 and tied for the title in 1940.

While he was head coach at SMU, Mr. Bell received many national honors. In 1948 he finished second in the poll to name the coach of the year. He was president of the American Football Coaches Association longer than any other executive, and was also a member of the NCAA Football Rules Committee. He has coached all-star teams for the East-West and North-South games and for games with the pros.





Bill Fox, 185, 6-1, 21, Senior, Norman, Okla. A fullback in high school, Bill was shifted to center in college and has lettered twice at the position. He proved a dependable offensive performer last year, his passes being accurate and his blocking more than adequate.

Joe Basquez, 205, 5-11, 21, Junior, Houston. As a sophomore Joe started several games at offensive left guard, although he got a slow start because of injuries. Darrell Lafitte, 202, 5-11, 21, Senior, Port Arthur. Fine work as an offensive guard last year won Darrell a place on several all-Conference selections, including that of the football scouts. He played 270 minutes as a junior.

Lou Miller, 210, 6-1, 22, Senior, St. Louis, Mo. Lou was a regular tackle on offense both as a sophomore and as a junior, but was highly impressive as a guard in the new formations during the spring drills.

S. M. U. FOOTBALL COACHING STAFF

SMU's football coaching staff is headed by Chalmer E. (Woody) Woodard, who came to the Hilltop last spring from McPherson College in Kansas, where he had been athletic director and head coach of football, basketball, and track.

Woody coached at McPherson for three years and during that time greatly improved the athletic standing of the school. In his first year there, McPherson lost five of its eight football games but the second year his team won seven of nine contests, and his 1952 eleven was undefeated.

Prior to his accepting the position at McPherson, Woody had coached in Kansas high schools for 10 years and during this period his teams won 81 games, lost 10, and tied two. Six of the 10 teams were undefeated. His 13 years as head coach in high school and college resulted in 99 victories, 17 losses, and three ties.

Woody is a graduate of Southwestern College in Kansas, and he also has attended Wichita University, Colorado State, and the University of Kansas.

Serving as one of the varsity line coaches is Dick Peters, who lettered in both football and track at Kansas State before becoming associated with the athletic department of Ottawa University at Ottawa, Kansas. During the four years that he was head football coach at Ottawa, the school finished first in the Kansas Conference once, second twice, and third once. His track teams won the conference championship each year. Tom Dean, varsity line coach, is serving his sixth year as a member of the SMU coaching staff. Dean starred on the strong 1945 SMU team and was voted the outstanding lineman in the Southwest Conference that season. After a career in professional football, Dean returned to SMU. Last year he was head coach of the Freshman team, which won the mythical championship of the Southwest Conference first-year teams with a record of four victories and one loss.

Dick Todd, varsity backfield coach for this year, starred at Texas A&M for three years before joining the Washington Redskins in 1939. After four years of pro ball, Dick entered the service and was voted the outstanding service player in 1943. He rejoined the Redskins in 1945 and played with them through 1948. The next two years he was varsity backfield coach at Texas A&M. In 1951 he coached the Washington Redskins but resigned this position in August of 1952 and retired from football temporarily. Athletic Director Matty Bell and Coach Woodard managed to get him to accept a seasonal job at SMU this fall.

Other members of the SMU football coaching staff are J. M. Keaton, who heads up the scouting unit; Herman Morgan, head freshman coach who assists with the scouting; Clinton McClain, coach of the junior varsity and also a scout; Frank Payne, assistant freshman coach; and Earl Walden, assistant freshman coach.

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Don Goss, 245, 6-4, 20, Junior, Dallas. When not on the injured list last season, Goss was the team's starting right tackle on defense. He was named the Conference's outstanding sophomore lineman by the Austin American because of his aggressive play against the Longhorns. Jack Gunlock, 200, 6-0, 22, Senior, Breckenridge. Co-captain Jack was used on both offense and defense last season, playing guard on offense and end on defense. He was shifted to tackle in the spring workouts, and his effective blocking aided materially in the development of the offense, and his fine tackling stood out on the defense.

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Ed Bernet, 195, 6-2, 19, Junior, Dallas. Ed won his letter as a sophomore in 1952, playing 95 minutes on the defense. He caught 7 passes for 78 yards. Ed was voted the most valuable high school player in Texas in 1950.

Malcolm Bowers, 185, 6-2, 20, Junior, Dallas. In his sophomore year, Bowers completed six of 17 passes for 58 yards. He is a good ball-handler and may get more opportunity to play under the new system and rules than he had in 1952.

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Sam Stollenwerck, 170, 5-10, 21, Senior, Forney. Sammy's fine passing and smart generalship in the Arkansas game last November not only won him honors as AP back of the week, but gained him the position of starting quarterback on the team. In the Arkansas game, SMU was trailing 0 to 17 when Sammy entered the contest in the second quarter. Before the half was over he had pitched the Ponies to a 21-to-17 lead. He threw three touchdown passes last year.

Tommy Hairston, 207, 6-2, 19, Junior, San Antonio. Tommy missed several games as a sophomore because of injuries, but turned in creditable work on the offense when able to play.

Doyle Nix, 185, 6-1, 20, Junior, Texarkana. Doyle played 239 minutes as a sophomore, although handicapped by injuries part of the season. He played on both the offense and defense.

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Jerry Norton, 182, 5-11, 22, Senior, Texarkana. Jerry led the Mustangs in rushing both as a sophomore, when he gained a net of 438 yards, and as a junior, when he was credited with 383 yards. He was the top ground gainer for the Ponies in 11 of the 20 games played in 1951 and 1952. He ranked fourth among the nation's punters in both years, averaging 41.8 yards in 1951 and 41.2 yards last year. Norton was the only player in the Southwest Conference to rank among the leaders in punting, passing, and ballcarrying last season. He played only offense in 1952 but gained experience on the defensive as a sophomore. Don McIlhenny, 190, 6-1, 18, Sophomore, Nashville, Tenn. Don established two new freshman records at SMU last season, carrying the ball 153 times in five games for a net gain of 646 yards. Eidom was the leading ground-gainer for the Colts in 1951 with 532 yards, and Norton was No. 1 in rushing for the freshman team of 1950 with 415 yards. Against the Texas Shorthorns, the Nashville Nugget gained 253 yards net. His longest gain of the year was 66 yards. In addition to his running, he threw four touchdown passes.





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Don Miller, 195, 6-2, 21, Senior, Bellville. After playing in the starting right half position on defense in 1951, Don won a position in the starting line-up of the offensive team last season. He led the Mustangs in the number of passes caught with 16, ranked fourth as a ball carrier with a net gain of 132 yards, and was a rugged blocker. Dale Moore, 195, 6-0, 22, Senior, Mt. Vernon. Superb blocking by Moore played an important part in SMU's 21-to-13 victory over Texas A&M last year. He scored two touchdowns against Arkansas, one on a pass and the other on a line plunge. Moore lettered as a defensive player in 1951 and as the starting offensive fullback in 1952.





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Frank Eidom, 185, 5-11, 21, Junior, Port Arthur. Hailed as a great running back because of his high school record and his remarkable ball carrying as a freshman, Eidom started off well as a sophomore, but injuries soon sidelined him. He returned in time to take part in the victory over Arkansas and the tie with Baylor, being SMU's leading ground-gainer in both of these games.

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Don Kilgore, 195, 5-10, 20 Junior, Denison. After sitting on the bench for most of the season, Kilgore was the SMU star in the final game of the year with TCU, as he scored the Ponies' only touchdown and was No. 1 for the Mustangs in the rushing department, with 67 yards to his credit. Don played a year at San Angelo Junior College before transferring to SMU.

Roy Pace, 172, 5-11, 21, Junior, Temple. As a sophomore last year Pace was used both on offense and defense. He played his best games against Georgia Tech and Missouri and was SMU's top groundgainer in both contests.
